# **Letter from Lesley**



Dear All,

I have done some terrible things. I cannot manage my life. I drink too much, eat too much and exercise!- never. My housing situation is precarious. I do not know whether I will be allowed to stay in this country or not. I do not have enough money to thrive. I am always anxious. I am faithless and frightened. Of course God does not love me.

### Does God love you?

Of course God loves me. Everyone loves me. Why would they not? I am successful. I am middle aged, white, straight, literate, my immigration status is secure. If I queue I will make sure the queue is orderly. I make things happen and I know I am loved and loveable. Sin? Well no more than a few minor slip ups. Every group would want me as a member. Of course God loves me.

# Both wrong.

God loves us because that is God's nature. Not our right or pay. We may not be worthy of love. We will not have earned it but still God loves us. God is generous loving and merciful.

Some of us need to rest in that love and allow it to seep through to our bones. We need to let that love to transform how we view ourselves. How we treat our selves.

Others of us need to remember that love in our dealings with other people. That they are loved and lovely too. Everyone is precious in God's sight not merely a few chosen financially, intellectually secure ones.

It is a life changing truth that easily we take for granted. God the creator of the universe has a high regard for us. God thinks of us as precious and would pick us up and hold us close to God's cheek. We cannot earn this. We do not deserve it. It says more about God than it does about us.

Today in the living of this day remember that you are a person that God loves. That person you are talking to is also loved by God. They are worthy of respect...and so are you.

#### A Celebration of the Life of Liz Bartlett



A service to celebrate the life of Liz Bartlett was held on Saturday 13<sup>th</sup> April 2024 at KURC. There was a wide variety of readings, music and prayer, and the congregation heard about Llz's professional life, musical life, her family and friends and her contribution to the church and community in north Kensington and Kingston.

Liz was born in 1941 in Holbeach Lincolnshire; she was the oldest of four children. Her father John Mossop was a solicitor with a triple first from Cambridge, and her mother had studied violin at the Royal Academy of music.

Early life of the family was disrupted by the war because her father John was away in London. Liz was at boarding school from the age of seven, first in Bournemouth, and then at Wycombe Abbey School. She was interested in music (choir, piano and flute) and made a number of lifelong friends. One of these was Hillary Bartlett who invited Liz to stay for a promenade concert where she met Hilary's brother Ken. Liz was 18 and Ken was 23. They immediately became an item. Liz then read English at Royal Holloway College, while Ken was in Oxford.

They married in Holbeach in September 1963. Three months later, Ken was ordained by the Church of England and in December 1963 they moved into a flat in Paddington where Ken was a curate at St James Church, Sussex Gardens. They had three happy years in Paddington but Liz was clearly not looking forward to being a conventional vicar's wife, so Ken's appointment to manage a housing charity was providential. They moved to North Kensington and their world changed. They moved from a church flat in prosperous Lancaster Gate, bought a house in North Kensington which they thought was wonderful but their parents thought was somewhat slummy! They exchanged formal Anglican worship for an inspiring but sometimes chaotic Methodist Church with a majority of West Indian members: Rachel and Ben grew up, became streetwise, and loved living in a multicultural area.

This new world became Liz's stamping ground over the next 30 years. Her natural gift of friendship underpinned all her many activities. Wherever she was, she instinctively included any people on the fringe.

Liz and Ken moved to Kingston 20 years ago, to be nearer to Rachel and Ben and the grandchildren. They became members of the Kingston United reformed Church because it shared the values and social outreach of the Notting Hill Methodist church – and because they had become unredeemably nonconformist! Over the last 10 years, Liz has contributed to building up the church's musical life. She was the prime mover in raising money to purchase our piano, encouraging church members to form a choir, and helped to support the purchase of our new organ. She even went on a conducting course to help in training the choir and gave regular support and encouragement to successive music directors such as Rhiannon, Sul Hee and Haeun. Without her personal encouragement many would not have joined the choir.

Liz also worked with other church members during the Covid lockdown. She saw the inability to have a standard Elders election process as an opportunity to diversify the elder membership. Liz chaired a group and worked with others with the result that our Elders' membership was diversified to include Korean members and younger members.

Liz and Ken were married for sixty years and close friends for three years before that. Ken thinks that this was some kind of miracle, because they were both free spirits with independent lives and interests. The standard claim that there was never any difficulty or cross word in their relationship is not a description of the marriage that they would recognise! They came through those times and emerged as the indivisible duo known as Ken and Liz. In this they leaned on the love and support they received from their close friends and family. Today is therefore not just a celebration of Liz's life. It is also a celebration of the love and friendship given by many people here today. Liz asked for a Shakespeare sonnet to be read at this celebration (Sonnet 116). It is about the love which is unmoved by any change.

Hymns included *Do shepherds stand tonight on Notting Hill?* by Geoffrey Atnger, sung by Frances Scott and *When in our music God is glorified*, sung by our KURC choir.

A few of our older members will remember my mother Barbara who passed away peacefully at a nursing home in Solihull on April 12<sup>th</sup> aged 97.



# **Encounter, Year 1**

I thought you might be interested to learn more about some of the topics which I have been learning about on my course with London Centre for Spiritual Direction.

We are being encouraged to keep a spiritual journal and regularly practice Examen and other types of contemplative prayer. Each week we spend half a session learning about the topic for the day and the rest is spent practising different listening skills/directing a fellow student.

The three years are divided as follows:

**Encountering The Tradition (of Spiritual Direction)** 

Encountering The Self (which will incorporate some modern themes within pschoanalysis)

Encountering The Other (working with others; many of whom may be different from yourself)

Topics include:

Creation, the Fall, Covenant, Exodus, Exile

### Themes From The Tradition

Desert Fathers & Mothers, Monastic and Benedictine Spirituality, Celtic Spirituality, Mystical Spirituality, Ignatian Spirituality

Content & Process, Consolation/Desolation, Spiritual Direction in the Bible, Models of Spiritual Direction, Prayer in Spiritual Direction

Incarnation, Paschal Mystery, Pentecost, The Body of Christ, Trinity

Here is something I was sent on the nature of spiritual direction that I thought would be useful.

# What is Spiritual Direction?

As in all relationships, our learning to know Christ better develops and deepens, is challenged and changes, as we experience life.

Spiritual directors (SD) or Accompaniers offer themselves to be companions on the way, guides on the pilgrimage. It helps people to see for themselves how their relationship with God can be strengthened and their prayer deepened.

The starting point for people who come to a SD varies enormously. Some need to discern God's calling to a life change, others have lost their former comfortable way with God and want to explore what their faith means now.

Some have a long story of God's love in their lives' others have never put their prayer and life with God into words out loud to a stranger.

Direction is not counselling and it is not one person telling another what to do and how to live. SD's do not direct! They are trained and experienced in sensitive, patient listening, trying to help people see more clearly and understand their own experience of God. They offer a safe, confidential place for people to find their own ways to come closer to Christ. The Holy Spirit is the true Director.

#### Who is it for?

Anyone who wants to deepen their relationship with God.

# **Nigeria**



Pray for the work of Open Doors and many other groups, as they call for international pressure on Nigeria's national and regional government, to ensure that they actively protect Christians from continuing slaughter.

In Nigeria, Christians and their communities continue to be attacked in many parts of the country, with the violence score at the maximum level possible. Although 2023 saw the installation of Bola Ahmed Tinubu as president, replacing Muhammadu Buhari, it is as yet unclear what this might mean for freedom of religion or belief in Nigeria.

#### **Pakistan**




Pray for Christians who live in fear of the country's blasphemy laws, which are frequently used against them - with a potential death sentence if found guilty. Similarly, violence against Christians in Pakistan has remained at a very high level, and the extremely high pressure on Christians remains constant. The blasphemy law's high potential to provoke violence was illustrated in the city of Jaranwala in August 2023, where up to 21 churches were burned or damaged and hundreds of Christians were forced to flee their homes.



#### Archive of the Month - The Guild


Between 1906 and the start of the Second World War our church organised weekly evening public lectures in the church hall on a varied range of subjects. This enterprise was known as 'The Guild'. You could purchase season tickets (initially two shillings, i.e. 10p) which guaranteed you a seat. It was run by a committee of twelve, and there were two 'honorary lanternists' who presumably operated the projector.


Our archives hold all the annual programmes, each printed to a high standard and often containing photos of the lecturers. What is remarkable is that the committee managed to attract such eminent speakers. For example, I have spotted the following names: Millicent Fawcett - campaigner for women's rights; Capt. Edward Evans – second in command on Scott's ill-fated polar expedition; Julian Huxley – evolutionary biologist: John Logie Baird – inventor of television; Countess Tatiana Tolstoy -Tolstoy's eldest daughter; G K Chesterton; Alan Cobham - pioneering aviator; Rev G A Studdert Kennedy or 'Woodbine Willie', and John Masefield the Poet Laureate.

In Korea there is a story told, a legend, about a man who dies and goes to Heaven. Before he enters Heaven, he says to the gatekeeper, "Before I go into Heaven, I'd like you to take me on a tour of Hell." And so, the man is taken, first of all, to visit Hell. When he gets there, he is surprised to see a long table piled high with the finest food anyone could ever want. But he saw that the people in Hell were starving, and he asked his guide: "Why is everyone starving?" "It's like this," said the guide. The man agreed that this really was Hell, and he asked to be taken straight back to Heaven. When he arrived in Heaven, he saw the same kind of table piled high with the very same food. But here the people looked so very happy. "No chopsticks, I suppose?" asked the man. "Oh yes," said his guide. "They have the same chopsticks, two metres long, and they must be held at the end: the same as in hell. But, here in heaven, these people have learned that as they feed their neighbour with the long chopsticks, their neighbour feeds them."
