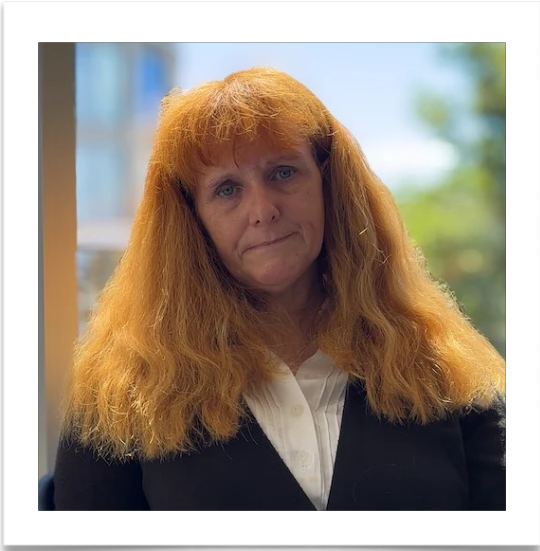

A recap of our 3 children and youth work priorities:



To create an all-age community that is accessible and mutually beneficial to all, including to non-English speakers



To encourage and support families in spiritual development in their own contexts



To engage C&YP in ECO Church related projects.

In the next two years, we will be offering groups/courses/events that feed into these 3 aims.

Our recent Messy Church was based on the theme, ‘What Is God Like?’ Different activity stations focussed on various characteristics of God – God is SPIRIT, God is CREATIVE, God is a GUIDE, God is LOVE. The photos show the results of a ‘flap the fish’ competition – a fun activity but we then went on to say that the Spirit of God is like wind/breath. The children also had the opportunity to create animals using clay, and we then talked about how God was able to be really inventive in creation. The activities always lead into a teaching point.

We then recapped what we had learned and prayed together.

We finished the afternoon with snacks.

Talking to our MP

At Church Meeting 14th July 2024 Christine T brought to the meeting that Christian Aid are encouraging churches to engage with their local Member of Parliament to build up links with regard to action on poverty, through climate justice, debt cancellation and diplomacy to bring peace around the world. This would be started by writing to Ed Davey. There was unanimous approval and Christine agreed to draft a letter. This was sent signed by the church secretary and minister on behalf of the church.

JPIT (Joint Public Issues Team) includes Baptist, Methodist and URC and is the team that provides the URC's Christian response to social issues (national and international). Some of the material that I write for Church News uses their briefings.

They are also encouraging churches to engage with their MP. I went to a ZOOM briefing of theirs which was excellent.

A quote that struck me was 'the difference between noise and influence is having a relationship' They are aiming for churches to build a long term relationship with their MP. (This campaign has been planned for a long time, it is a coincidence that it started as we've had an election and new Government).

My first question was how does this link in with something similar which Christian Aid is doing. I was assured that they were complimentary (a member of the team used to work for Christian Aid). Ray Charlton is going to a briefing from Christian Aid at the end of September. Then Ray, Carol and I will have a talk. So watch this space. Do get back to me with any questions or comments.

And just for the record Global Justice Now formally World Development Movement (of which Christian Aid was a founding member) and I am a member of is also doing something similar.

Carol's College Update

As I write this, I am sitting in a room at Northern College in Manchester for my last college weekend. Two years ago, I arrived feeling excited along with a dose of much nervous anxiety and wondering what lay ahead of me as I began my two (and a bit) years of training as a minister of word and sacrament. I have been introduced to theological reflection, hermeneutics (interpreting the Bible), the history and doctrine of Christianity, aspects of pastoral care, worship, spirituality and discipleship and mission and evangelism. Above all I have been made aware of the importance of context and relating what I learn to the context I am in. It has been challenging and stretching as well as satisfying and inspiring.

Over the next few weeks, I will finish putting a portfolio together showing how I have grown during my time as a student both my strengths and weaknesses and as I've become more self-aware how I hold them in tension. I am also visiting some different cafes to see how they run with an interest in the idea of a pay what you can café. So far, I've been to two Christian run cafes - Revive in Crawley and Andy's café in Woking. Two very different cafes. One had a tree on which prepaid items were available and the other literally had a box for you to pay as you feel. Both had pros and cons. For me it was inspiring to talk to people about their cafes and how they came into being and how they introduce God into the space. The foyer coffee bar plays an integral role in the weekday community of Kingston URC and is a base for community work.

At the end of November, I will be ordained as community minister at Kingston URC.

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AGM Update

Church Secretary report to KURC AGM 8th September 2024

It is fair to say that this has not been an easy year for the leadership of KURC. There has been a lot of “missing” but also “not missing”.

Our minister Dr Rev Suk In was missing, not by choice. Our minister Lesley took a well-earned sabbatical.

There was what felt like a sudden loss of our serving church secretary early in December.

There was a lot of stepping up needed from our church community, including the elders.

This was achieved and we need to thank God for his guidance during this time. Indeed, it has been commented by some that we have become a more united group open to listening to the Spirit.

Sometimes it can feel as though there are not as many people worshipping together. This is not true; we have become a truly hybrid worshipping community. Using technology, we have enabled those who would not have been able to attend in person to our worship, bible studies, prayer groups, social groups and meetings to be included and it is great. It has allowed better consistent attendance at meetings. The elders would like it if more people could be involved in our church meetings and have been trying to address this. After a time of very speedy purchase and learning we have come through our technological problems. We have good technical backup from an organisation that specialises in church tech matters. It will never be perfect. We are not the BBC! We can always do with more people willing to assist the use of live streaming. We give thanks for the faithful servants who do give their time. Janine, James, Jay and Ella.

Being connected has been very important during this time. Our church has been working on this. Many of us take social media for granted. What! there was life before WhatsApp! How can that be? How did people conclude their meeting plans? How did we share our prayerful focus? To keep our online presence, we need people who love sharing the news from our church, uploading pictures and writing. Our thanks go to Stu, Natasha and Ting. But don't leave it all for them. Respond to their postings, share our postings within your personal social networks if you can. I do need to let you know that each of the church's social platforms content is monitored.

We can and do still use the phone and post to share with others. The weekly notices and sermon are sent to people that do not use the internet.

Let's not forget the power of meeting people in person. There are many groups that have grown from friendships developed in this church. Our foyer is open every day and people use it. It depends on volunteers, and we are grateful to each one of you. Activities and events develop from here. Community meals continue and it is growing. We look forward to seeing the developments that Carol will be able to offer in her new role as Community Minister for Kingston URC.

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Young children come to our church with their families, including child minders. They come because under Sally's leadership we offer a place to play and to find out about God. Thank you to all who support these times.

Suk In and So Young lead activities for families whose home language is Korean. Their joy in sharing the love of God is so important and their tireless support in helping our Korean friends to understand our, occasionally eccentric British ways.

That for me is the "not missing" part of our story. God's work has been going on and we need to use our senses to know of it.

And so, we welcome back those who have been missing for a while and we cherish all our opportunities to be in fellowship together.

Minister's report for the AGM 2024

In the times of darkness as in times of light God is with us. We did not have an AGM in 2023

We have been through a dark time. It is a shocking thing that people came from a country where abuse is rife to our church and they were abused/exploited again. A distorted picture of the gospel presented to them as the truth. There is a sadness that people were not all we thought they were and a challenge about how we trust again. It has been a dark time. But in the darkness there has been light.

Some people are still only at the first phase of recovery from this time. We are all in different places. It is like a bereavement. People recover in different ways and different paces. Equally it is not all in a straight line. Things hook people and remind them and they go backwards. It is OK that we are all at different points. But we need to remember this. Some need to allow others to be positive and forward facing and others need to let people take their time. We have been through a traumatising event and it has been closer to some than others. But if you are from the 'that was then this is now crack on school' you need to remember that Rev Dr. Suk In Lee was only cleared to return from suspension on 17th February 2024 and even then they put him on a safeguarding course which delayed his return further. That is only 7 months ago

There have been said been positive things from this hideousness. A developing closeness of relationships for those who can allow others to love them. The gift day result was amazing considering how things are. Major donors dying and leaving. We are fortunate that new people are joining us...in the building and on zoom.

For the future clearly our on-line presence becomes increasingly important. There will always be ways we can make it better. The danger of that statement is that we do not celebrate what has happened and we lack gratitude for those who have worked so hard to make it happen. For example- thanks to So Young and Paohan for their quiet work of weekly translations of the sermons.

OK there are things we need to do but as I said we need to be aware that we are in different places and we have been impacted to varying degrees by what happened. We need to make sure that that we do not go backwards and lose the expensive treasures of this dark time

What are these treasures? Well I would say...and I am sure you would add more and I would like to hear them...

As I said there is a closeness in relationship and people desire to know each other more. The lanyards are about learning who is who.

Thanks to those who have stepped forward to cover for others and do the work of the church. Thanks to Cathy for stepping up as church secretary...again. To So Young for all she had to do while Suk In was off.

There has been a sense of people being real with each other. To be a community where people are allowed to be vulnerable and do not have to pretend to belong to be a part of is a major mission opportunity. -its been expensive. Let us not go backwards but build on these hard fought for gifts.

What a blessing to know that even though bad, terrible things happen God is with us and we will survive. We will not sink. That is true individually and as a church. God is the God of the church and the God of us God's people.

Psalm 86

There are 3 traditional types of songs in history; lullabies, wedding songs and laments

In our usual communal reading of the scriptures, we rob ourselves of a major source of comfort in difficult times. We rarely use the psalms of lament.

The biblical witness underscores the value of lamentation. It takes the brokenness of our human experience and brings it into the broken heart of God.

It is OK to lament. As a culture, as a church culture, there is a danger we forget how to hold negative emotion. In Church it has all got to be light, and joy. But God is large and merciful and able to hold our sadness and it is madness to avoid the biblical language of suffering just when we need it the most.

The other feature is that we lament not only on our own but together. You may not know all the detail but you know that there has been a traumatic event and we lament carrying each other; with each other. In the psalms the message is -together we have suffered. Together we express our trust not in human beings, not in ourselves but in God.

Eco Tip

Contribute to wildlife conservation. Clean bird feeders to prevent diseases spreading to winter migrants. Install a nest box well before breeding season to provide a cosy retreat for small birds during cold winter nights. As you observe the local birds reflect on this verse, 'I know every bird in the mountains, and the insects in the fields are mine.' Psalm 50:11.

Marvel. Marvel every time you see a child learning to walk and speak at the same time. Share in their delight. Wonder at the dawn of each new season: sunshine and shadows, falling leaves, frost, sudden new growth. You are still alive to take it all in. That's an unexpected bonus.

Appreciate. Have a look around your living room and concentrate on items designed for your comfort and entertainment, which your forbears never had. Think of someone you don't like; now ponder a couple of their good points. Try to desire their welfare more than their downfall.

Forgive. (That's a condition for being forgiven). You may have to do it over and over again for the same person. Unearth grudges which have been lying under the surface. Are they worth preserving that much? Think of the damage they are doing you.

Married or Single? Don't envy. The grass on the other side of the street isn't greener, it's just different. Count your blessings – some will be uniquely yours. Be concerned for the welfare of someone whose circumstances are unlike yours.

Deal with disappointment. If you have become grumpy it's probably caused by a deep-down dissatisfaction with yourself. Stop raking over past failures. Each morning when you wake up, say with the Psalmist, "This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it."

Change. No, it isn't too late. It will only be too late to change when you are in a coffin. In the meantime, there's still room for manoeuvre. Remember John Henry Newman's words, "To live is to change, and to be perfect is to have changed often."

Tribute to Maggie’s Sister



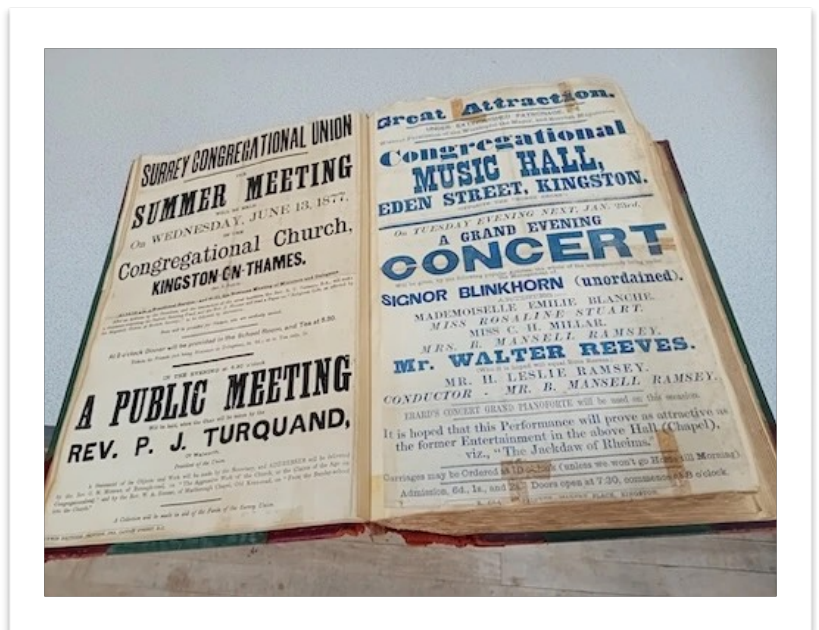

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Derbyshire Well Dressings

You may have heard of the well dressing custom, where villages in Derbyshire take turns to decorate their wells and other water sources with elaborate artistic creations made out of natural materials – flower petals, leaves, moss etc – all stuck to a clay base. The custom is thought to have originated from ancient rituals, where offerings such as flowers were placed beside springs and wells to give thanks for the county’s fresh water springs. There are so many villages involved that you’re bound to find one somewhere at any time between May and September!

Having said all that, the first one we saw was actually in February, as part of a ‘Ways of Water’ exhibition in a gallery in Sheffield. It was created by the well dressers in Youlgreave, the village we lived in for a few months before we moved into our house in Sheffield. As it was in the winter, they used dried organic materials foraged from the local area.



More recently, we visited Stoney Middleton near Eyam (the ‘plague village’) to attend the dedication of their three well dressings. There was sunshine, a brass band, hymns and prayers of thanks, stalls and activities ... and an excellent tea and cake tent!

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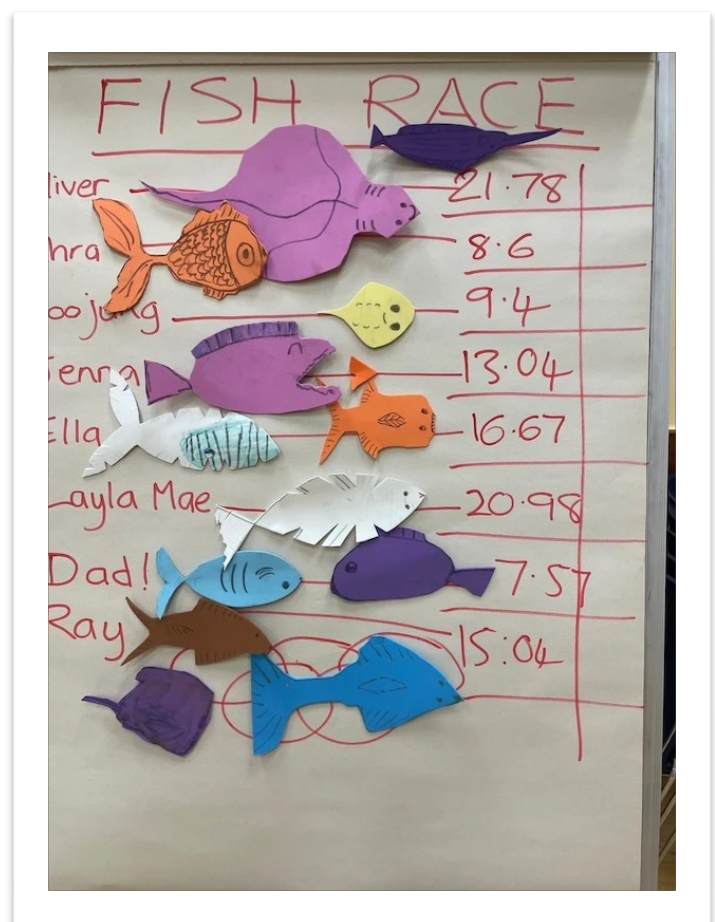
Commitment to life prayers

Olive Oil Prayer Equipment – bottle of olive oil, a bowl and cotton bud. Olive oil is not only used for cooking but is also used for anointing. Anointing means putting oil on someone’s head or hand when you bless them. The bottle of olive oil should say where it comes from. Place a drop or two of oil into a bowl and using a cotton bud, dip it into the oil and touch it into the palm of each hand or draw the sign of a cross on the forehead of a friend. As you do so, say: ‘God bless you and use you to do good things.’

Prayer Dear God, we thank you for our homes, the places where we feel safe, the places where we belong. We pray for all families and people who worry about having somewhere safe to live. We pray for peace in Israel and the occupied Palestinian territory, so that people can share fairly and live without fear. Amen
