## LETTER FROM LESLEY



Dear All,  
What can I do to make the world a better place?  
I'm only one. I'm not significant. What difference  
can I make?

From the minute we started our conversation I knew it was not going well. Anything I said, he took it the wrong way. I'm not saying it was his fault. I, like all of us, can be irritating. I know that's a shock to all of you! But once we had started on the road, you could tell it was not going to go well. Eventually I had the brains to shut up. When I did so, the penny suddenly dropped for him and he articulated the way forward. He said what I had been asking for, for the last 30 minutes. But the whole encounter left a bitter taste. Indeed, here I am still talking about it.

Then there are the horns. More than ever before. The car horns. People have lost patience with each other. There is a simmering anger in the air. People are doing daft things and somewhere inside them is an unrecognisable fury.

Think of the things that normally compassionate human beings are saying about people who choose to go to sea in dinghies. People who take the risk with their children. The language that some are using is incredible, disgusting. That is not to say, 'open the borders, let them all come'. It is to say, 'these are people, and need to be treated and spoken about as such'. There is need for mature, rounded debate. Nuanced. Not just opening your mouth and letting all manner of hideousness spew forth onto people who cannot protect themselves. Slogans are a sort of verbal car horn.

What can we do? What can we do when the anger boils in each of us?  
What would be a gift to society? How can we bring about change? How can we do the work of the kingdom?

The answer is peace. That would be the gift.  
Peace for Jesus is the first thing he says after the resurrection. 'Peace be with you'.

What would peace look like for those around us?  
Peace is not all smiley niceness. Sometimes peace is asking tough, brave questions and taking the time to learn from the replies. Listening, more than speaking, as a general point.

How can I make this situation better? Not just for me, but for everyone. What a glorious ambition and one that we can all be a part of.

## CATHY'S CONVERSATION



What a sense of joy there can be in the church. People connecting, making time to share conversations and food. And did I mention gratitude to God in song and prayer?

Thanks to the thoughtfulness of one of our members we have been thinking about the ways that we collect and give thankfulness for the money given to support not just the running of this church, but also the wider URC. The informal February church meeting gave people time to share their views.

Traditionally, almost all financial gifts were cash and put into the collection bags during the service, prayed for and dedicated. Because of the changes in our relationship with money, more options for giving have been opened. Not so many of us use cash; we tap or insert a card or set up movement of money directly from our bank accounts. Some people still use cheques. We have the option of keeping special weekly envelopes that we can put money in and bring with us when we come to church. There is a way to simply tap and give in the sanctuary. What matters is that we think about it and action it.

Let me be clear, this is not a request to you as individuals to give more, although it might be for some. We each need to reflect and review how much we give. Crucially, it is about how we collectively offer and dedicate what we can donate. The actual money that is collected on Sundays is but a part of the total money given. How do we hold the generosity of our members and friends in thankful prayer?

## **BARBARA FIELDING – 12. 8.1933 – 11.12.2024**



Barbara had a childhood which was steeped in the war years. She had an older sister, Joan. Sadly, Barbara's Mum died in 1939 and her father in 1949 and during the war Barbara was evacuated to Barley, Hertfordshire. These were her happiest years growing up in the countryside which she grew to love. During the war years Barbara contracted polio; she recovered but it probably coloured her whole life thereafter.

Barbara met Alf Fielding through mutual friends and they married in 1951. They lived in Aveley in Essex at first and then moved to Wimbledon in 1955. Four children followed – David, Mandy, Denise and Steven. Barbara managed to work around the children – she preferred service type work which brought her into contact with people as a housekeeper, a carer in a care home, as a cook and in retail. Summer holidays were mostly in Cornwall. After the children had left home Barbara and Alf were able to travel more widely and bought a home in New Malden.

Barbara continued to work until the mid-80's and then started voluntary work with the WRVS, a mobile library and a clothing store for refugees. Some time after Alf's death in 1993, Barbara renewed her interest in historical sites and was able to visit the Pyramids in Egypt, the Holy Land, Pompeii, Russia, the Wild West and Vancouver. Similarly, she would attend any type of live performance in the West End. Barbara was a proud Londoner all her life, absorbing the culture, history and its uniqueness.

Barbara loved to read anything that educated or informed her and was a champion of the public library system. She was also a lifelong and avid gardener and everything had to be grown from seed!

Barbara's faith story comes in three parts – there was an Anglican church in Barley, the nearby Anglican church in Wimbledon and, following Alf's death, becoming a member of KURC which, she said, enriched her faith journey and her life. Barbara thereafter helped with the foyer coffee service, with fund-raising for church renovations and was a member of the Social team, at the same time volunteering in a local charity shop.

After a life well-lived, Barbara leaves 4 children, 7 grandchildren and 4 great grandchildren.

As Lesley said at Barbara's Service of Thanksgiving, hopefully she's able to get out and about in the next life, as she would never be one to rest in peace!



## PETER NOEL

We have heard that Peter Noel has died. The Noel family (three generations) joined our church following a move to Kingston from Tooting after the war. Peter became very active in our Youth Fellowship in the 1950s and took part in their annual Christmas pantomimes. He was a prominent member of the Tabard Players and drove the church bus on Sunday mornings. He married his first wife, Marjorie, at KURC and settled in the Woking area. Peter spent most of his career at Coutts Bank where he met his second wife, Ann, and retired as Manager of Trusts in 1996. Until Covid he often attended our morning communion services; more recently he had been worshipping at a local church. In retirement he enjoyed family life and foreign travel.

We extend our sympathy to the whole family.

## 24 HOURS OF PRAYER

Our next 24 hours of prayer will be start on Friday, 7<sup>th</sup> March, at 6 am and finish on Saturday, the 8<sup>th</sup> at 6 am. Time to prepare for Lent on the way to Easter.

The purpose is to stop and take an extended time to be intentionally in God's company.

We do not expect lightning, nor loud words of knowledge. Often, though, there are themes that rise up. Often people say things that link with something that someone else said 6 hours earlier. Or certain themes from the scriptures are heard often.

People pop in and out throughout the 24 hours. Usually about 40 of us take part in some way. Each time we do this, more and more of us lead it. 'Lead an hour' can be reading a passage from the Bible and hosting a conversation. Or using prayers written by another. Or singing. Or exploring a theme from a book we have read. I'm happy to give a theme.

## ***Senior Church Leaders in South London make Joint Statement for Children & Young People***

**To church leaders, church goers, people working in or with Christian organisations and churches, representatives of churches together groups, local ecumenical partnerships and other ecumenical organisations in South London**

In a meeting during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, church leaders, who make up the ecumenical partnership of Churches Together in South London, issued the following joint statement:

“As we pray for Christian unity, we recall the words of Jesus, who said “Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these.” (Luke 18:15-17)

We stand together united in supporting our young people and their families. We celebrate this young generation and remain steadfast in our commitments to protect and nurture their futures. This year, we have tragically already witnessed children killed and injured in our capital city. We grieve with the families and call on the government to advance their plans to create safer streets for the young members of our communities. Churches remain amongst the largest providers of youth and children’s work amongst many of the most deprived communities, and we are keen to continue to share our ongoing experience through our partnerships with the statutory authorities. As church leaders, we provide a broad range of youth activities and welcome all families to participate. We pray that our projects and programmes can bring joy, friendship and hope for more young people this year.”
